### Global Connections Track Studio Workshop

- Learn and share simple hand stitches to make functional and artistic repairs to existing garments.
- Explore sustainability through fashion with visible mending techniques inspired by sashiko, quilting, and embroidery traditions.

# Relevance to teaching and artistic practice

- Students' interests in the environment, fashion, society, and culture
- A new way to teach or emphasize elements of art and design such as line, color, shape, space
- Cross-curricular opportunities involving history, geography, mathematics, ecology
- Opportunities to establish intergenerational teaching-learning and community partnerships
- Applicable and adaptable to K-16, museum, and community settings

### Definitions to get started...

- Mending repairing textiles using stitching techniques, visible and invisible possible
- Darning (reweaving/reknitting) mending a hole or tear in a textile by connecting the original threads/yarns with stitching, no patch
- Patching (applique) layering a textile above or beneath another, can be purely functional or decorative or both, held together with stitching
- Sashiko "little stabs" the types of functional and decorative stitches used in quilting & mending (Japanese, Edo era)
- ▶ Boro "rags" mended or patched textiles, hemp and cotton
- Quilting joining layers of fabric with stitching, three layers (top, batting, back)
- Running Stitch a stitch used in multiple techniques basting, hand-quilting, mending, regular/even/uniform stitch that goes in and out in and out
- ▶ **Embroidery** decorative stitching on fabric, such as satin stitch & stem stitch

Darning (reweaving/reknitting) – mending a hole or tear in a textile by connecting the original threads/yarns with



#### Functional (& Artistic) **Darning Inspiration**

Darned cuffs by Collingwood-Norris and instructions from the WWII Make Do and Mend campaign by the British government




First clear the loops of fluff and broken ends of threads from knitted garments or clip away ragged edges from machine knit fabrics. Always use a darning ball under large holes. 3. Choose mending as fine as



- 1. Make the darn the shape
- 2. Darn up and down the hole first; work on the wrong
- the material of the garment.
- 4. Begin a good distance away from the hole in order to reinforce the thin parts round the hole.
- 5. Space the rows of darning the width of a strand of mending apart.
- Pick up the backs of the loops only unless the material is very fine.
- Leave loops at the ends of each row and darn so that stitches alternate with spaces between stitches in the previous rows.
- Pick up the edge of the hole in one row then go over the edge of the hole in the next row. If you have cleared the edges of the hole you will find this will be easy and will make a neater mend on the right side of the garment.
- 9. Continue the darn over the thin place beyond the hole.

#### Darning over the first rows of darning



- 1. Darn over the hole only and about two stitches of darning beyond.
- Leave loops at the ends of each row, and only pick up on the needle the darning stitches.
- Pick up the alternate strands of mending in first
- In alternate rows, pick up the strands of mending you passed over in the previous

### Darning Materials & Tools

- Darning Needles blunt or less sharp with large eyes
- Darning egg, mushroom, or similar to shape (knit) fabric
- Thread/yarn of similar texture and weight of the garment to be repaired, usually cotton or wool



The thirteen-year-old's jeans. Two holes in the same leg. Patched with circular pieces of quilting cotton that are larger than the holes.

#### Running Stitch - a stitch used in multiple techniques basting, hand-quilting, mending, regular/even/uniform stitch that goes in and out – in and out





Utilized a running stitch attach the patches. Drew overlapping circles with a Mark-B-Gone marker. Continued running stitches to secure and strengthen patches around/over holes and decoratively.

#### Sashiko Materials & Tools

- Sashiko thread soft, strong cotton thread in matte white usually, made with specific type of twist
- Sashiko needles long, very sharp, and rigid
- Traditionally indigo cotton fabric of medium weight with a loose weave
- Gridded ruler
- Water Soluble white pencil
- Grid or stitch stencil



Quilting – joining layers of fabric with stitching, three layers

(top, batting, back)

Gee's Bend quilts often made with recycled textiles and fashions by Emily Bode made with recycled quilts







### Quilting Materials & Tools

- Hand quilting needles (betweens) – sharp, thin, shorter
- Quilting thread thin, cotton or cotton covered polyester
- Quilting cotton tightly woven
- Quilting frame

Repaired holes in collar fabric by layering another piece of fabric on top the collar and stitching through all four layers of fabric reminiscent of quilting.

## Embroidery – decorative stitching on fabric, such as satin stitch & stem stitch

### Embroidery Materials & Tools

- Embroidery needles based on various types of embroidery, larger eyes than regular hand sewing needles
- Embroidery hoops

Embroidery floss or thread separated




